20.1 No person shall feed, or permit the feeding of, a wild animal in a manner that creates a nuisance. 20.2 No person shall place any food or feeding device on any property in a manner that creates a nuisance.

20.3 No person shall feed or permit the feeding of a wild bird, unless;

a) having the permission of the owner or occupant of the property on which the bird is fed;

b) making food reasonably inaccessible to wild animals and ensuring that food does not attract wild animals in a manner that creates a nuisance;

c) promptly removing and disposing of any excessive spilled seed or other food to ensure it does not attract wild animals; and

d) ensuring that the feeding does not create a nuisance

Specifically see the following in the Vaughan by-law

"PART 11.4 FEEDING OF WILDLIFE

(1) No person shall intentionally feed a wild animal or leave food or attractants of any type or in any form out of doors in such a manner as to attract, or be accessible by a wild animal, feral or stray domestic animal on private or public property.

(2) Subsection 1 does not apply to the feeding of song birds on a property, provided the following feeding requirements are met by the resident:

i) Seed is placed in a bird feeding device that is sufficiently above grade as to not attract or be accessible by wild animals;

ii) Bird feeding practices do not attract large flock of homing birds such as wild, feral or domestic pigeons; and

iii) Spillage of seed upon the ground is removed by the property owner or resident forthwith and disposed of in such a manner that it does not attract wild animals, feral cats

Feeding Wildlife Regulations 6. No person shall Feed or permit the Feeding of Wildlife.

7. Notwithstanding Section 6., a person may Feed or permit the Feeding of: a. birds on private property using bird feeders that are suspended off the ground, which dispense commercially available bird food such as seeds and nectars; b. songs birds where it is permitted by the Central Lake Conservation Authority on lands owned or managed by that Authority;
