1. CALL TO ORDER

Councillor M. Albano, Chair called the meeting to order.

Committee and staff briefly introduced themselves.

2. DISCLOSURE OF PECUNIARY/CONFLICT OF INTEREST

There were no disclosures of pecuniary or conflict of interest.

3. SCHEDULED ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

3.a Minutes of the Accessibility Advisory Committee Meeting held on November 22, 2023.

THAT the Minutes of the Accessibility Advisory Committee Meeting held on November 22, 2023, be received.

4. ITEMS TO BE SCHEDULED FOR NEXT MEETING

4.a Update on Accessible Stairs for Acton Pool

T. Forbes advised the committee that the accessible stairs have been well received and are being utilized daily for all sorts of programming including Aquafit. The stairs can be easily removed when the area they are situated in is required for lane swims.

4.b Funding Request - Accessible Push Buttons for Accessible Washrooms at the Gellert

T. Forbes noted that at the November meeting it was brought to staff's attention that there were no push buttons on the accessible washrooms located in the public area and the pool deck of the Gellert Community Centre. The facility is now 20 years old, although built in accordance to building code at the time the two standalone accessible all gender washrooms were not equipped with automatic openers. Staff support the request by the committee and are requesting funding to rectify this situation. For provision and installation of two (2) power operated door openers, the cost will be \$8023.96 plus tax. This cost does not include electrical, staff will have the electrical funded from the operating budget.

Recommendation No. HHAAC-2024-0002

THAT the Accessibility Advisory committee approves funding for two (2) power operated door openers at the Gellert Community Centre in the amount of \$8023.96 (+HST) to be taken from the Municipal Accessibility Plan Capital Project Account.

4.c Update - Accessibility at the Cultural Centre

A. Matthews and J. Smith provide the Accessibility Committee with information regarding audience accommodation at the John Elliott Theatre, particularly concerning sold-out events and general seating availability. The presentation highlighted the ongoing efforts and procedures in place to ensure accessibility for patrons with special needs during events at the theatre.

The theatre offers both General Admission and Reserved Seating configurations for events, with event organizers having the autonomy to choose the seating arrangement. The Front of House Manager is on-site to oversee ushers and assist patrons with special needs and other issues that arise. Volunteer ushers are often provided by the organization running the event, and while they receive an orientation, they may not have

extensive experience dealing with patron special requests. The John Elliott Theatre has 6 positions where seats can be removed to accommodate the placement of a wheelchair. Because the theatre layout uses stairs to access the individual rows, the positions are in the front row (Row A, 2 locations) and the back row (Row N, 4 locations).

Efforts are made to accommodate patrons with diverse needs if seating is available. The theatre is not obligated to prevent seats from being sold to patrons without special needs to reserve seats for potential patrons with special needs. Since all ticket sales are conducted on a first-come, first-served basis, it is a possibility for a patron to not be able to be accommodated based on availability.

The theatre is equipped with a hearing assistive loop system to accommodate patrons using hearing assistive devices. The hearing assistive loop system allows patrons with compatible devices to receive audio signals directly to their hearing aids or cochlear implants, enhancing their listening experience during performances and events.

The Town has long been aware of the preference to install sliding doors at the main entrance of the facility. This was not included in the original plan due to cost constraints at the time. In 2024, the Town has approved a capital expenditure to retrofit the front entrance with sliding doors. The work is anticipated to take place in the third quarter of this year.

The theatre is committed to providing a welcoming and accessible environment for all patrons, including those with special needs. Measures are in place to address accessibility challenges during events, such as sold-out performances with General Admission seating, while adhering to fire code regulations. The facility has ample Accessible Washrooms that can be accessed by elevator. The elevator and link hallway provide access the accessible seats in the front row.

J. Smith advised the committee that staff recently had a situation where accommodation did not occur for a patron on the autism spectrum, this resulted in a complaint that staff have taken seriously and have been addressing. The complaint arose out of a sold-out general admission event with a waitlist. Staff have looked into the situation and noted that due to the general admission and the multiple stakeholders running the event the accommodation was not done. Staff are addressing the matter with the complainant and are looking at their practices and procedures to see if they can try to better accommodate in the future.

The committee expressed disappointment that this situation occurred and requested that staff review their policies, practices, and procedures for future accommodation requests. Staff will report back to the committee on their review and any actions they may be taking in the future.

4.d AODA Improvements for Signalized Intersections 2024

M. Roj made a presentation to the Accessibility Advisory Committee 2024 AODA Improvements for Signalized Intersections.

M. Roj noted that it has been an 18-year journey to where we are in terms of AODA Improvements for Signalized Intersections. The Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, (AODA) 2005 came into effect and with that the first Accessible Pedestrian Signal (APS) installation at Guelph Street (Hwy 7) and Mountainview Road in 2006. In f December 2012 the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, added new design standards for the Design of Public Spaces that apply to new construction and the redevelopment of elements in public spaces. New or redeveloped pedestrian crossings with curb ramps or depressed curbs must have tactile walking surface indicators with "raised tactile profiles" that have a high tonal contrast to the adjacent surface. The Town of Halton Hills as part of its commitment to AODA has committed to installing or updating three (3) Signalized Intersections per Year

M. Roj reviewed Accessible Pedestrian Signals, Tactile Walking Surface Indicators, Sidewalk Platforms, and other Pedestrian Safety Improvements with the committee, explaining the requirements and what the Town has done to meet those requirements.

M. Roj advised that the Town has 3 signalized intersection projects for 2024 they include;

- Main Street North (Hwy 7) and Moore Park
- Guelph Street (Hwy 7) and Mountainview Road addition of tactile plates
- Main Street and Mill Street in Acton

It has historical and associative value, it is associated with the Currie family, Albert Cormier and AMMA Canada. The property has contextual value as it maintains, supports, and defines character. It is visually, physically, functionally, and historically linked to its surroundings. The were no issues brought forward by the owners of the property. For all these reasons it is recommended that 9156 Trafalgar Road be designated.

4.b Research and Evaluation Report - 25 Mountain Street - Barraclough House

The property has physical and design value, it is a unique Queen Anne Revival style home with a high degree of craftsmanship and artistic merit. It has historical and associative value, it is associated with the woolen mill industry, Ernest Barraclough and family and Lucy Maud Montgomery. It has contextual value as it is a significant landmark, linked to its surroundings, and is an unusual and interesting home in the community. The owners of the property are supportive of designation. For all these reasons it is recommended that this property be designated.

Recommendation No. HHH-2024-0011

THAT the Heritage Halton Hills Committee recommend that Council issue a Notice of Intention to Designate for the property at 25 Mountain Street for designation under the *Ontario Heritage Act*.

Coordinators Report

Administrative update:

- -OBIAA Membership renewed for 2024, Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce Membership not renewed.
- -We were denied full financial support for the Canadian Summer Jobs Program (CSJ). The program was offering 50% wage coverage for the two student funding programs. We had to confirm or withdraw the application. This has happened to many BIA's this year and OBIAA is looking into the changes. We are bringing on a Co-op Student and have various student volunteers who require the 40hrs of community service to help us out this summer.
- -The draft recommendations for the M.O.U. have been sent to Erin Kaiser at the Town of Halton Hills. I have expressed that these are our "deal breaker" items. ie: Town to arrange and pay for annual audit.
- -The 2024 Downtown Acton Business Directory has been compiled, published and release to all BIA members and the public by email and a pull-out section in the Acton Monthly news.
- The BIA contacts directory and website are underway with a complete overhaul to represent business and activities in Acton and serve as the one stop umbrella for all BIA media and events links.
- -Year end financials and the annual Aduit are underway. The audit requirements from the office were sent in on Friday Feb. 9th with some follow up continuing on the weekend and Monday Feb. 12th.

Beautification / Graffiti update:

- -Holiday Lights came down Feb. 5th, Banners went up. Holiday light displays were put away shortly after. Valentines display in the Parkette was put up and removed after the occasion. St. Patrick's display in the Parkette will be installed in early March.
- -Monday Feb. 5th, Monica, Mike, Chris and I met with members of Town of Halton Hills departments to finalize the placement of the benches and garbage receptacles purchased in 2021. Some benches are already in place, the map of garbage receptacle placement has been determined and is included with a report to the Town to open work permits and complete the project. Funding is coming from RED Grant monies allotted in 2021 for this specific project. Installation timeline TBD.
- -Flowers: A committee meeting was set for a Feb. 7th discussion of downtown flower planning and was cancelled due to other administrative issues coming up unexpectedly. Julie at Flowershed has been contacted and can meet at our convenience to discuss a plan based on our needs and budget. I have a list of actual quantities of what is needed, and placements preferred.
- -Graffiti tagging took over part of the Downtown area, mainly along Mill Street from John Street to Giant Tiger, Church Street to Knox Ave. I have the police involved, photos have been collected of all the tags, submitted to Halton Police and the Town. Officer Wentzell and I visited all the affected building tenants / owners to encourage filing police reports. Officer Wentzell will keep me advised on the investigation. The Town has started cleaning municipal property that was tagged.

Events and Festivals update:

- -Outdoor Market and Leathertown applications are available online already. Emails to all of last year's vendors are being sent out. We already have applications and payments coming in.
- -70 Below Treats is offering to sponsor a different street character at the Leathertown Festival this year. Does someone want to sponsor Georgetown Spiderman if he is still available?
- -A professional stage has been booked for the main stage this year. Ken Baker will be stage managing and providing the equipment again this year. The bands for the main stage are also booked, I am currently working on the secondary stage. Rotary was the secondary stage sponsor last year, I will follow up with them as I start the Sponsorship Fundraising next.
- -We have a potential opportunity to bring the Northern Heat Ribfest to Acton on the August long weekend. I am currently working at promoting the heck out of how great Acton is for this event to come here.
- -We have the potential to host fireworks shows whenever we choose to. I am considering a 10pm New Year's Eve mini countdown community event at Prospect Park. Supernova Fireworks has contacted us to offer their services when needed at a very affordable price.
- -The BIA are supporting Sarah Brophy-Platts and her office with an Easter Egg Hunt event in March. Details are still being worked out.

Complaints:

- -Other than the graffiti tagging, I am still monitoring and following up with the town Enforcement offices regarding the burned-out lot on Mill Street East. We do have a formal investigation filed with the enforcement department and I have been contacted as to the status of the lot remediation.
- -The Town had some concerns about some of the sidewalk retail signage around downtown. I have spoken to the business owners, and they have resolved the concerns.

On behalf of Halton Regional Council, I am writing to request support for the Association of Municipalities of Ontario's (AMO) call for a comprehensive provincial social and economic prosperity review to promote the stability and sustainability of municipal finances across Ontario.

Current provincial-municipal fiscal arrangements are undermining Ontario's economic prosperity and quality of life. Nearly a third of municipal spending in Ontario is for services in areas of provincial responsibility and expenditures are outpacing provincial contributions by nearly \$4 billion a year. Municipalities are also being asked to respond to complex health and social challenges, such as homelessness, supporting refugee and asylum seekers and addressing the mental health and addictions crises. Inflation, population growth, rising interest rates, and provincial policy decisions are further constraining municipal fiscal capacity.

Underscoring the need for a new provincial-municipal fiscal arrangement, is the reality that municipal revenues, such as property taxes, do not grow with the economy or inflation. Property taxpayers, including people on fixed incomes and small businesses, cannot afford to subsidize income re-distribution programs for those most in need.

As Halton Region continues to work with our Local Municipalities to support achieving the Province's target of building 1.5 million new homes in Ontario by 2031, the Region is responsible for providing the housing-enabling water and wastewater infrastructure required to support the local housing pledges of the Halton Municipalities. The local housing pledges represent a significant acceleration of growth in Halton totalling 92,500 units by 2031 which is a 70% increase over the growth anticipated in the Region's Infrastructure Master Plans.

The funding required to deliver this infrastructure is significant – \$5.2 billion is needed to support growth to 2031, with \$3 billion being required to support residential growth. In addition, since 2018 there have been a number of Provincial initiatives and legislative changes related to the supply of housing in Ontario that impact the ability of municipalities to collect development charges. This means the Region will require an alternative source of financing for some of the major infrastructure required to support accelerated growth.

In December 2023, Halton Regional Council endorsed a resolution requesting a new fiscal framework (New Deal) for Halton to address the on-going provincial funding shortfalls for cost-shared health and social services programming, the shortfall in development charge revenues, and to ensure critical water and wastewater infrastructure is adequately funded to keep pace with accelerated growth. The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) is also calling for a new municipal growth framework, one that grows with population and the economy ensuring municipalities can continue to respond to the growing challenges being faced in communities.

Accordingly, at its meeting held February 14, 2024, the Council of the Regional Municipality of Halton adopted the following resolution:

RESOLUTION: Provincial-Municipal Funding

- 1. THAT Halton Regional Council supports the Association of Municipalities of Ontario's call for a comprehensive social and economic prosperity review with the Provincial Government to promote the stability and sustainability of municipal finances across Ontario.
- THAT the Halton Regional Chair write to the Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing outlining support for AMO's call for a social and economic prosperity review including the need for a new fiscal framework (New Deal) for Halton Region.
- 3. THAT a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Halton's MPPs, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and Halton's Local Municipalities for their information.

Municipalities and the Provincial Government have a strong history of collaboration. The Provincial Government can, and should, invest more to help respond to the needs of growing communities. Now is the time for a comprehensive social and economic prosperity review to ensure the long-term fiscal sustainability of municipalities across Ontario.

This letter will serve to advise that at a meeting of City of Quinte West Council held on March 6, 2024 Council passed the following resolution:

Motion No 24-167 – Notice of Motion – Housing Funding Moved by Councillor Stedall Seconded by Councillor Armstrong

Whereas the City of Quinte West is in need of \$28M in funding to complete the West End Trunk Sewer Main replacement in 2024, which is critical in the ongoing development of new homes in Quinte West;

And Whereas the City of Quinte West requires \$58.6M in funding to upgrade the Trenton Wastewater Treatment Plant Upgrade building to accommodate new homes to be built;

And Whereas the City cannot afford to increase Water, Sewer or Tax rates to fund all of this infrastructure;

And Whereas increased Debt to build the projects will just increase costs to Water, Sewer and Tax rates, or increased costs to developers;

And Whereas the City of Quinte West is currently experiencing a housing crisis from all citizens but specifically with regards to over 250 requiring housing, from Military members of CFB Trenton;

And Whereas City Council approved a Housing Action Plan with a projected 831 new residential units to be completed based on anticipated Housing Accelerator Fund funding over 3 years;

And Whereas the Federal government denied the City of Quinte West the Housing Accelerator Fund;

And Whereas the City of Quinte West is not currently eligible for funding under the Provincial Building Faster Fund as its population is below the threshold;

And Whereas the City of Quinte West may make application to the provincial Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund which has only \$200M available in funding of which the province would only fund up to 73% to a maximum of \$35M for one project;

And Whereas additional funding has not been allocated from the Federal Government to enhance the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Funding;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved That the City of Quinte West calls on the Federal Government to re-evaluate their lack of funding for municipalities with a population less than 50,000 in rural Ontario and to make available funding for infrastructure programs to help build infrastructure to help build much-needed new homes;

And Further That the Province of Ontario be asked to invest more than the currently allocated \$200M into their Housing Enabling Water Systems Fund;

And Further That this motion be circulated to Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Federal Minister for Housing, Ryan Williams MP, Premier Doug Ford, the Provincial Ministers of MOI, MMAH, and Todd Smith MPP, and all municipalities, for their support. **Carried**

Please be advised that the Town of Cobourg Council, at its meeting held on February 28, 2024, passed the following resolution:

WHEREAS subsection 27(16) of the Ontario Heritage Act stipulates that any non-designated heritage property listed on the municipal register of properties as of December 31, 2022 shall be removed from the municipal register on or before January 1, 2025, if the council of the municipality does not give a notice of intention to designate the property under subsection 29(1) of the Ontario Heritage Act on or before January 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS since January 1, 2023, municipal staff and members of the municipal heritage committee in the Town of Cobourg have been diligently working to: review the municipal heritage register; research the heritage value and interest of listed (non-designated) properties; review and research the heritage value and interest of non-designated properties; contact owners of such properties; determine which properties should potentially be designated in accordance with the provisions of Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act; and take all required steps to designate such properties; and

WHEREAS the above-noted work involving 213 listed properties in the Town of Cobourg is extremely time-consuming and cannot be completed by December 31, 2024 with the limited municipal resources available.

I am writing to you today to share an update on Bill 21, Fixing Long-Term Care Amendment Act (Till Death Do Us Part), 2022, and to request your support for this important legislation.

Bill 21 amends the Residents' Bill of Rights set out in section 3 of Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021 by adding the right of residents not to be separated from their spouse upon admission but to have accommodation made available for both spouses so they may continue to live together.

The Act was inspired by Cambridge resident Jim McLeod, who will have been separated from his wife of 65 years Joan, on September 17, 2023. Nearly 6 years later, Jim continues to champion spousal reunification. He often says that he will talk to anyone and has two giant binders full of his advocacy work on the Bill. Last week, he told me that his heart is breaking because of his separation from Joan. He has brought other seniors who are separated from their spouses into the advocacy – you cannot sit with these folks for any amount of time and not care deeply about this legislation.

I know that you value the many contributions that older adults have made to Waterloo Region, and care deeply that they can live their final years with dignity and love. I am hoping you will consider bringing a motion forward to your Council, in support of the Till Death Do Us Part Act. Your support will help us to keep attention on this important legislation, so that it can finally be called to the Standing Committee on Social Policy – one step closer to Royal Assent.

BACKGROUND:

On November 15, 2022, the Till Death Do Us Part Act, passed second reading in the Ontario legislature after being introduced for the third time in September 2022. The bill was then referred to the Ontario Legislature's Social Policy Committee. You can view highlights of the second reading debate here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mYRlgQqDe2k

I have been pushing for the Standing Committee on Social Policy to schedule a time to begin the work of reviewing Bill 21 since November 2022. **Today marks 286 days since the Act passed second reading at the Legislative Assembly of Ontario.** Unfortunately, the Bill has yet to be called to committee.

Bill 21, which was formerly Bill 153 and 95, respectively, had passed second reading and was sent to the Justice Committee in December 2019, but was wiped off the order paper when Premier Ford prorogued the house in 2021. It was reintroduced early 2022 but did not have time to progress before the election.

Since I first introduced this Bill in 2019, the number of people who've reached out to my offices with heartbreaking stories of couples entering long-term care who are torn apart has skyrocketed. Simply put, Ontario seniors deserve dignity in care and should have the right to live with their partner as they age. Of note, Nova Scotia passed similar legislation, titled the <u>Life Partners in Long-Term Care Act</u> in 2021.

Following many meetings with stakeholders, it's clear that "care campuses" which offer different levels of care (independent, assisted living and long-term care) are the progressive model for investing in quality care for Ontario's aging population. Care campuses are an essential element to keeping couples together as they often age at different rates. This level of choice has been brought to my attention as especially important to rural and northern municipal leaders across Ontario. The care campus model for seniors housing that builds different levels of care has unique financial savings that will be critical as we grapple with a rapidly aging province.

We need the Bill to be called to the Standing Committee on Social Policy as soon as possible. We know that couples who are separated across Ontario cannot wait any longer for this legislative change to be made.

At their last regular meeting on Wednesday February 21, 2024, the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Perry supported the following:

Whereas under Ontario Regulation 391/21: Blue Box producers are fully accountable and financially responsible for their products and packaging once they reach their end of life and are disposed of, for 'eligible' sources only;
